Undergraduate Program

Department News:

- Kelli Myers was selected as the department's Outstanding Senior in Agribusiness and as CAHE's Aggie of the Year. She also served as national president of the American Agricultural Economics Association (AAEA) Undergraduate Student Section.
- Neil Appel was selected as the department's Outstanding Senior in Agricultural Economics.

New Degree Program

Final approval for the new BS degree in Environmental and Resource Economics and Management is expected when the Regents meet September 6. It will be a unique degree in the Northwest. Classes in environmental and resource economics, policy, law and management will be hallmarks of the degree. Students will explore special interests by focusing electives on complementary minors such as pre-law, forestry, range management, and sustainable development. Future environmental and resource economists and managers will learn to make decisions while carefully weighing the trade-offs between protecting, restoring, developing, and allocating natural resources for the greatest benefits to society.

Student Recruitment

Maria Rodriguez will join the department this fall as the Undergraduate Student Recruitment Coordinator. With a BS in Agricultural Economics from Texas A&M, an MS in Agribusiness from the University of Missouri as well as teaching and marketing experience, she will lead the department's 1-year campaign to jumpstart the new degree and increase number of majors in both Agricultural Economics and Agribusiness.

Graduate Program

The dissertation by *Rafic Fahs* (2001) was selected by the AAEA for Honorable Mention in the Outstanding PhD Dissertation competition. *Wen Du* (PhD candidate) received the AAEA Sylvia Lane Fellowship for 2002-03. *Kristine Grimsrud* (PhD 2002) received the 2002 Harriett B. Rigas Award for Outstanding Woman Doctoral Candidate at WSU. She was also selected Outstanding PhD Student and *Toby Ripplinger was* selected Outstanding MA Student in the Department of Agricultural Economics for 2001-02. *Tauhid Rahman* is the national president of the AAEA Graduate Student Section.

Where They Went: Nine students completed their graduate degrees this past year. Three took university teaching positions and the rest went to private industry. 17 new graduate students are expected to join the department this fall, bringing the number of enrolled graduate students to 46.

New Area of Specialization

At the request of the Army Corps of Engineers, the department will offer an MA area of specialization in Water Resources Policy. Corps employees accepted into the program will take 1 semester of intensive coursework on campus and a semester of local and distance education courses near their places of employment.





SPOTLIGHT ON NEW FACULTY

Fabio Chaddad, Assistant Professor, will teach an introductory level course in agribusiness management and a graduate class in microeconomic theory. His research activities focus on the economics of user-owned and controlled organizations, including agricultural cooperatives, credit unions, and mutual banks. Fabio is also interested in the organization and performance of agribusiness networks and chains applying new institutional and organization economics.

Originally from Sao Paulo, Brazil, Fabio has been in the U.S. since August 1996, when he started his Ph.D. program at the University of Missouri. After receiving his doctoral degree in 2001, Fabio joined the Agribusiness Research Institute and the Graduate Institute of Cooperative Leadership at Missouri as a post-doctoral fellow.
